What is possible when forces for change work together?

In June I had the extraordinary privilege of representing The Women's Fund of Essex County at **The White House Summit on The United State of Women**.

I was among 5,000 attendees from across the country who participated in the inspiring program focused on Violence Against Women, Health and Wellness, Economic Empowerment, Entrepreneurship and Innovation, and Educational Opportunity, Civic Engagement and Leadership. The topics closely aligned with the funding priorities of The Women's Fund of Essex County.

We heard from political, business, entertainment and women's advocacy leaders. In a remarkable demonstration of The White House's commitment to empowering all women, we were addressed by President Obama, Vice President Biden and First Lady Michelle Obama.



The core messages were consistent. We celebrated the progress we have made as a nation, as the result of the work of generations before us, while focusing on the need to continue to work together to achieve the goal of true gender equity. As the First Lady noted, "The work always continues—we are never done." (A statement that resonates with all of us!) And Vice President Biden was one of the many speakers who emphasized how important it is to include men in the conversation.

When girls are given opportunity and education, and their voices are heard, magic happens. This was best exemplified by my visit to Excel Academy, the first pre-k to 7th grade charter school for girls in Washington DC. The energy, enthusiasm for learning, engagement and school pride by the students inside the school walls was sharply contrasted by the world outside its doors. It brought the aspirations of the Summit into sharp focus, reminding me of what is possible when forces for change work together. Most importantly, it was a tremendous validation of the work The Women's Fund is doing in Essex County.

We thank our generous community for all your support. To the nearly 500 individuals who completed our survey, we are incorporating your feedback into how we can best continue to impact the lives of women and girls in our communities. We know the need is real, the opportunities are great and working together creates change. We are committed to empowering all women and girls in Essex County and to strengthening their families and communities so that we can create real, sustainable social change. Thank you for being an important part of The Women's Fund community of Essex County.

THE NEED IS REAL

Snapshot of 3 Generations of Essex County Women Living in Poverty



YOUNG GIRLS & TEENS

Young girls and teens need guidance, role modeling and support in developing positive self-image, confidence and skills to make smart decisions which will impact the rest of their lives. At-risk girls, in particular, need support to envision new opportunities and build a path to success.

- **1 in 4** girls does not finish high school. The drop-out rate is even higher for girls of color. A young woman who does not complete high school has a significant probability of living her life in poverty.
- A young woman with only a high-school degree earns **62%** of the average college degree salary – far below a living wage.
- **1 in 4** high-school girls has been a victim of violence. Physically or sexually abused girls are **6X** more likely to become pregnant as a teen.



SINGLE MOTHERS

Poverty and its issues are particularly acute for many single mothers who juggle work, childcare and often parent care. Critical issues not only challenge the well-being of these mothers, but impact the wellbeing and futures of their children.

- **1 in 4** families with children (<18 years) is headed by a single mother; **32%** live in poverty. Poverty rates are higher for women of color.
- Of the over **25,000 children** who live in poverty, **more than two-thirds** live in single-mother homes.
- The **vast majority of homeless-shelter families** are single-mother families.
- **42%** of single mothers have no higher than a high-school degree or equivalency.
- Low-income single mothers spend approximately **4X** the percentage of their income on childcare as other families – if they can access childcare.
- **59%** rent, preventing their ability to build equity.



WOMEN AGES 65+

Senior women are much more likely to live in poverty than similarly aged men. On average, senior women live longer on significantly lower financial assets (if any). These women struggle with a range of issues including high cost of living, lack of financial knowledge, elderly abuse, inadequate nutrition and food insecurity, medical and prescription management, access to transportation and isolation, among others.

- **68,600** Essex County women are aged 65 years or over (17% of females): **34%** live alone and **8%** are heads of household.
- **1 in 9** lives below the poverty level (11%). **Poverty levels increase significantly** for women who are 75+, women of color, divorced or unmarried.
- **1 in 3** relies exclusively on social security as her sole income. The average annual social security income for a single-woman head of household is **\$8,813**, approximately **200% below** the poverty level.
- Many senior women are responsible for care of their grandchildren. **5,140** children live with their grandmother as a single-woman head of household.

Among our 23 grantees for 2016 were nine agencies who applied to us for funding for the first time. We would like to introduce you to a few of these agencies.



In the category of Economic Self-Sufficiency and Security, **LEAP for Education** received a grant for their *Girls Who Code* program. LEAP, based in Salem, has partnered with the national organization *Girls Who Code* to train young girls in computer science and to foster an interest in tech-related fields. Women are underrepresented in computer technology fields, and this program encourages girls to consider future careers in this growth industry.



The Women’s Fund is pleased to support *Improving Health Outcomes for L.I.F.E.* offered by **North Shore Elder Services** to improve health outcomes for low-income frail elders. Monthly visits by registered nurses, who help identify barriers to self-care, and trained volunteers accompanying elders to medical appointments are the hallmarks of this program. It dovetails perfectly with our Health and Well-Being field of funding as it provides a pathway for elders to remain living at home.



The Leadership and Empowerment field of funding award recipients include **Bellesini Academy**, which focuses on providing scholarship education to middle-school students in Lawrence. Our funding supports *After-School Enrichment and Evening Study Program for Girls’ School*, designed to promote leadership opportunities and personal growth. The girls are able to choose from a wide variety of activities, including sports, arts, drama, and service club, ensuring after-school hours are productive and empowering.

Where is she now? An update from Leidy Rodriguez

Five years ago, the guests at our Annual Grant Awards Luncheon were captivated by the words of our young guest speaker, Leidy Rodriguez. Leidy spoke about how the YWCA of Greater Lawrence’s Fina House changed the course of her life. When we met Leidy, she was 21 years old, and her daughter Genesys was 3. She had fled the Dominican Republic to escape from a physically and emotionally abusive partner three years earlier. She sought emergency shelter at Fina House having arrived in the United States with no family or friends here and unable to speak any English.

Leidy’s advocate at Fina House helped her map out a plan for her future. She finished her GED in two months and enrolled in Northern Essex Community College. After a year of taking English classes, Leidy began taking Business Management classes. Three years later, when Leidy spoke at our Luncheon, she had moved out of Fina House, and was working full time as a receptionist at a dental office to support herself and her daughter. She was also going to college part time at night to work towards her Associate’s Degree in Business Management.

We reached out to Leidy to find out how she was doing, five years later. This was her response:

“From the last interview, I was 21 years old. Now I am 26 years old. Many things have changed. From working at a dental office for almost 6 years, I fell in love with the dental field, and decided to change my major. I transferred to UMass Lowell for Biology. My plan after that is to attend dental school to become a dentist. Making that decision, I also realized that I had to make others, for example, leaving my current job. I understood this career takes a lot of your time and you have to dedicate yourself to it. Although, it



could be possible to work part time, I didn’t want to risk my grades. My decision was just to focus on my education. Also, spending more time with my daughter. Right now Genesys is 8 years old. She is in 2nd grade. I wanted to be able to help her with homework and reading time. Sometimes you have to make sacrifices in life to become better. And if it takes living on a budget for a couple of years while getting my education, then that’s what I’m going to do. My daughter deserves it. Luckily, my mom is very supportive. She is doing very well since she came from the Dominican Republic. She is learning English. I was able to get her a position at the dental office where I used to work. At the end, I want to be able to relate to the following quote: “Ten years from now, make sure that you can say that you chose your life, you didn’t settle for it.”

We at The Women’s Fund are proud to support the outstanding programming that the YWCA of Greater Lawrence offers, and we wish Leidy continued success. She is a great mom and will make a wonderful dentist!

The Women’s Fund Builds for Habitat!

During the past year, The Women’s Fund proudly participated in two build days for Merrimack Valley Habitat for Humanity. We worked both days at a site in Lawrence where a convent was being converted into ten family apartments.

Our group included Women’s Fund Advisory Board members and community volunteers, including our youngest volunteer yet, a 16 year old from Beverly! We were joined on the second day by some of the new residents of the home. Together we caulked, painted, moved rock piles and even raked and seeded a new lawn! We left with a great feeling of accomplishment and we saw the building not as just housing, but as a real home.



We are very proud to support Habitat and the work they do to create safe housing for hardworking, eligible families. We look forward to our next onsite experience.

The Voice of Our Donors

The Women’s Fund values your opinion! In 2003 eight visionary and passionate women created The Women’s Fund. Today we are a vibrant volunteer organization dedicated to creating transformative social change for women and girls. As our impact has continued to increase, we decided to engage with donors, non-donors and volunteers about your experience and to ensure we are meeting your expectations in our work. So we asked!

A big “thank you” to the almost 500 individuals who completed our on-line survey this winter about your perceptions and experiences. Thanks to all of your responses, we were able to reach our response goal and award a \$1000 grant to Merrimack Valley Habitat for Humanity. We have carefully studied your responses and we are using them to help guide our strategic planning. We thought you would enjoy a short summary of the findings...

Several broad themes emerged in the responses.

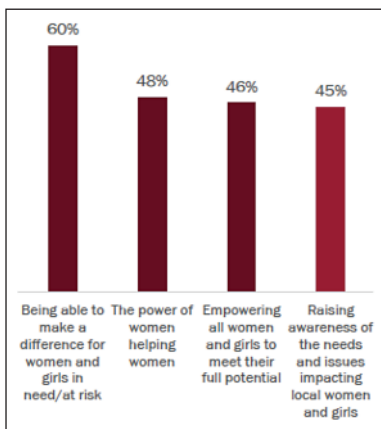
